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MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Guardians.

It was great that we were able to have lots of members of our school learning community join us for assembly last Friday. Unfortunately due to a building site inspection I wasn't able to be present, but the students always appreciate any chance for members of their family to be at school. On that note, next Friday March 10th is one of our most anticipated days of the school year, our annual VIP Day. As part of Catholic Education Week, our VIP Day is a great day for members of our wider school learning community to come together for assembly at 11:30 a.m, followed by classroom visits and then a shared lunch. Courtesy of TH Kitchens & Joinery and the school Parent's and Friends, we will be having a sausage sizzle available, and order forms have gone home for this. I can't wait to see everyone next Friday.

On a more serious note, I need to again remind all parents that *no student at St Mary's should be using any social media spaces*, such as Tik Tok, Snapchat, Facebook, Discord etc. My long time previous work in this space before becoming Principal here has seen me support students and families with many serious and significant situations that have involved students using social media spaces who should not be, some from as young as 8. I can assure you, saying no now, is significantly better than the potential consequences. I repeat, *no child under the age of 13* should be on any social media platform, this includes some gaming sites and platforms as well.

As a school, we have no 'jurisdication' if any issues in these spaces take place outside of school. Any issues in social media spaces needs to be dealt with via the eSafety Commissioner, the social media platform itself and the police, if it can't be resolved via parents. Unfortunately though, we deal with the aftermath of any issues which have big impacts on student friendships and their learning. Dealing with any flow on effects of these

issues, takes up valuable time of school staff which takes them away from their core work of learning and teaching. The potential for these issues are completely avoidable if parents do not let their students use social media spaces that they are not emotionally mature enough to handle. I have added some further information on how to deal with social media issues in this newsletter.


CAR PARKING DURING PICK UP

PARENT & TEACHER INTERVIEW - WEDNESDAY 8TH MARCH

HOW TO BOOK YOUR PARENT TEACHER INTERVIEW

Parent teacher interviews are scheduled for Wednesday 8th March from 12:00 noon to 6:00 p.m. We will be using the COMPASS Parent Portal to make the bookings. These bookings are able to take place face to face, however we do ask that *if you are at all unwell on the day, do not attend* and make an alternative time to meet with your child's teacher.

Please note that whilst the interview bookings are visible via the COMPASS app, the booking system currently needs to be accessed via a web browser.

To make a booking, log into the COMPASS Parent Portal via a computer.

- In your news feed, you will see the link to the Bookings section, also known as 'Conferences' and can also be found under the 'Community' menu.
- The first time you access this you will be given a quick tour of how to make a booking.
- Simply select your child from the top right of the booking window.
- Then select the teacher from the right hand side by clicking on their name.
- Finally select the time slot you would like the interview for and click on it and make the booking.
- If you have more than 1 child, you will need to repeat the process for each child.

If you experience any difficulties, please contact your child's class teacher or the Office.

FIRST WEEK OF LENT

(Week beginning 27th February)



We begin our annual Lenten Project Compassion journey by learning about Laxmi,a 16-year-old girl living in Jajarkot, a remote district in Nepal where almost half of the population live below the poverty line. Tragedy struck when Laxmi was 10 years old and her father passed away. Her father worked hard to pay for his children's education and, after losing him, Laxmi was at risk of falling further into extreme poverty.

With the support of our partner Caritas Nepal, Laxmi joined a child's club at her school where she was encouraged to resume her education. Through the child's club, Laxmi developed the skills and confidence to become a leader, advocating for clean water taps at her school.

Laxmi is now excelling in her studies and working towards her dream of becoming a civil engineer. She continues to be involved in the child's club, serving as an advisor and mentoring the next generation of young leaders at her old school.

SOCIAL MEDIA - What to do when things go wrong

Firstly, to repeat the message, *no student under the age of 13 should be using any social media spaces*. Please note too, that lots of gaming platforms and sites are also social media spaces given the ability for real time communication whilst students are playing games.

If your child is using a social media space and things go wrong, below is a list of information from the eSafety Commissioner on how you can support your child. Please note that if this happens outside of school, the school has no 'jurisdiction' to implement anything other than to support those involved and direct them to the appropriate resources.

If something similar was to occur during school time, using school devices and school digital plaftforms, then the school would become involved via implementing it's own and CEDWW policies.

When things go wrong online:

"Please don't fall into the camp of 'not my child'. It is your child."

Listen, think, pause

Gauge the scale of the problem. Does it exist in a peer group or is it more widespread? Is it a few remarks here and there? Or is it more serious? Empathise with your child and let them know that you understand how they feel.

Try not to respond immediately.

Take some time to consider the best course of action. Reassure your child you are working on it and will come together again very soon to talk through some options. Let them know you are there if they feel like they need to talk in the meantime.

Prevent further contact

Advise your child not to retaliate or respond to bullying messages, as sometimes people say hurtful things just to get a response and it could make things worse. If they have already responded, encourage them not to respond further.

Act to protect your child if necessary

If your child is being threatened, or if they indicate a wish to harm themselves, you should get professional help. Call Triple Zero (000) immediately, if their physical safety is at risk. Contact a counselling and support service like Kids Helpline.

Collect evidence

Don't delete the posts or abusive material straight away. Instead, start by taking screenshots and collecting evidence including dates and times. The evidence may be useful if the behaviour continues and you need a record of how long it has been going on. You may also need evidence if you want to report it.

However, if the material involves sexualised images, be aware that possessing or sharing images of people under 18 may be a crime, even if you have just taken a screenshot for evidence purposes. For information about relevant laws in Australia, visit Youth Law Australia.

Report the online harm

Report the content to the relevant online service provider. Many social media services, games, apps and websites have a simple process to report content posted by other people. The eSafety Guide (link below) has more information about how to report issues to commonly used online services.

If the service provider does not take action after 48 hours, you or your child can report to eSafety. We will ask you to complete our online reporting form and include evidence, such as a receipt, reference or report number from the service provider.

eSafety will determine whether the abuse meets the the legal definition of what can be removed. We can then take action to get serious cyberbullying material taken down and provide advice, support and assistance.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION REGARDING DIOCESAN SPORTS TRIALS - from the CEDWW Sports Team

Diocesan sports trials are mainly for Year 6 students and some Year 5 students who show a high standard of skill and sportsmanship for the chosen sport, however, if there is an exceptional younger student they may be considered.

Each school in the Diocese is restricted to a certain number of students for each sport, so a school trial may have to be held if we have too many names. We are normally permitted 4 spaces for each boys and girls event. Preference may also be given to Year 6 students if we have too many nominations. Once we have finalised the nimations at school, **parents are responsible for registering their student** via the **https://csnsw.sport/** website

To be eligible, students **MUST** have an out of school commitment to **participation in the chosen sport.** If your child chooses to nominate for a trial and is selected, we will give you further information on the registration process. Parents are responsible for transporting your student to the trial and any associated costs as part of the Diocesan trials process.
